

JUNE 9th - Jugularity

Guest Artist Night, April 2015

Greg was our MC for the April concert. Poet Stephen Whiteside opened events with a lively, almost rap-like cameo of the Ned Kelly story, his life, history and the whole sociology of Ned and Co., and was followed by a song in French called Choose Your Own Opium(?) by Francesca. Visitor Rob Leerveld and crew took the audience on a cruise of sorts to the Antipodes, a convict ship in fact, with Black Velvet Band, then Lazy Harry's and Flash Jack.

Frances delivered a sobering verse called The Saddest Thing detailing the devastating effects of drugs on a young person's life, in this case that of her own son's. Not only on his life but on all who have borne children, nurtured, raised and educated, befriended or valued a young person and then to have lost them to the wily dealer. She followed this with Ain't No Sunshine and If You're Happy And You Know It.



Then the fascinating history by 'Blue The Shearer' of The Wingen (NSW town) Wingers Club. The Three D's (Dominic, Dieter, Don)

sang Stan Graham's fine song of the Italian immigrant experience to the Barossa Valley, followed by a rousing Callabrisella Mia with the guest performer adding her spirited voice.





Haiku is a highly refined poetic form of traditional Japanese verse consisting of short subtle observations with all sorts of allusions to the seasons and the natural world, contained in three lines of 17 syllables of 5, 7, 5 each. This has nothing to do with tonight's concert except that Alex has elevated the Hailku form to a uniquely Australian style he calls Rooku, with equally subtle observations though the number of lines and syllables are of no consequence at all. Got all that? For example: Politicians and nappies need changing for the same reasons; Women deny their

age. Men refuse to act it; The difference between a Harley and a Hoover is the dirt bag is on top. Etc.

Guest Artist Night, April 2015



Kavisha Mazella with Mathew Arnold on fiddle was our main performer and put on a wonderful show of heartfelt songs and interesting dialogue about her life experiences and the beliefs that shape her life and work. Kavisha has a

multicultural background and as a consequence has a rich set of experiences to draw from. In her life she has produced six fine cds and was awarded the Order Of Australia in 2011 for her services to singing, songwriting and reflecting the

experiences of Aboriginal, refugee and multicultural communities through her performances. She is also an ARIA Award winner, and is perhaps best known as the founder and conductor of the Italian women's choir in Melbourne, and before that the Joys Of The Women choir in Fremantle 1989-93.

With her pure voice accompanied with guitar and Mathew's sensitive violin, and very personable nature, she charmed the audience with her songs and tales. Fisherman's Daughter was her first song, also the title of one of her cd's, and followed with a song about Melbourne's wonderful Victoria Market. Let Your Troubles Melt Away was a tribute to her philosophically inclined husband, and a joyous Sing For Everyone.



Thanks spot acts for your contributions to the evening, some good clever verse this night. And thanks of course to all who helped with the success of the night. The May concert will feature Melbourne's quirky Men In Suits a'cappella choir, bound to be hit. Hope to see you then.

THE NATIONAL FOLK FESTIVAL 2015

For me the Festival started on the Thursday at the National Library where the Folk Conference was being held. There were some good speakers presenting papers and a concert over lunch. This year I thought I would give the festival orchestra a go as Stephen joined this last year and learnt some really good tunes. This year was no exception, David Johnson and Wayne Richmond put together some 8 tunes that, with the harmonies they carefully put with them, sounded beautiful. After 4 daily practice sessions, David deemed us worthy of performing to the public. I was nervous but with so many friendly people either side, I loved every minute.



I had a couple more opportunities to play my trusty Tenor recorder and one was in the slow session every morning (I only actually made 2 mornings). These were good for me as I don't normally play these tunes, especially the jigs. When a jig was speeded up I glanced around and noticed a lot of faces concentrating very hard - my fingers had given up so I just sat and listened. The other one was the Advanced recorder

session, which suited me well, as they played tunes I knew with harmonies. I coped much better here.

My dancing time included the English dance display as I was part of the "Well Hall Dancers". For this display we all had new Regency style costumes and we all looked so grand people walked straight past, not recognising us. We did 3 displays on the Piazza and each time we were blessed with an appreciative audience and dry weather. The latter being most important as our hats were not allowed to get wet. I carried a brolly in my bag just in case.

The sound in the Coorong was much improved from last year, so much so that the dancers could hear the music and the caller. I particularly enjoyed the Heritage Ball where Heather Clarke opened the ball with 5 dances from the late 1700s. The contrast from these elegant dances to the modern day bush dances and their music was very marked.

At the Contra I met a chap who had travelled 2000 miles just to come to the Contra dancing at the National – he was certainly a very keen and enthusiastic dancer. Stephen played in the Contra band so I was able to stay right to the end and not worry about meeting up with him later.

I didn't get around to many concerts but I saw "The Hexhamshire Lass" Helen Capes play her Northumbrian small pipes and enjoyed her choice of songs. I also saw Bob Fox by accident and then, later, deliberately. I also saw a couple of groups, 'Senor Cabales' (with whom 'Delia's Friends' shared a concert at Newstead last year) and 'Appalachian Heaven'. Mainly I did dancing and playing.

After excellent weather all weekend, as we ate our dinner on Monday night we saw a huge flash of lightening and then heard the thunder. We managed to buy our dessert (ice-creams) and get into the Budawang for the farewell concert before the rain fell down in earnest.

Well-known folkie Enda Kenny is about to go on a musical tour of Europe, and to celebrate this event and to help finance it, he hosted a house party at his house in Northcote on Saturday 18th April.

Increasingly, house concerts seem to be a wonderful and fun alternative to the more traditional concert in a hall. And there is much to be said for them—a homely, relaxed atmosphere, with lots of food and drink within reach, catching up with old friends, and a great feeling of closeness to the performers that is often lacking in a more formal environment.

Enda was accompanied by Dave O'Neill, brilliant mandolinist, guitarist and fiddle player from Canberra. His spirited contribution greatly enriched Enda's beautiful songs, and his skill at weaving from one instrument to another and up and down the guitar fretboard in a quasi-classical manner had us all enthralled.

Enda performed a few of his classic old favourites, such as 'The Mary Ellen Carter' and 'Streets of Joyce' as well as some of his more recent songs like 'King Street' and 'Heart Tattoo' plus the amusing 'I Lost an Eye at Nariel Creek'. A great night had by all—well worth the \$25 entry fee!

THE MAN FROM SNOWY RIVER FESTIVAL

Maggie Somerville and I attended "The Man From Snowy River Festival" in Corryong over the weekend of April 11th and 12th. Corryong is a small town nestled among the hills in the far north east of Victoria, close to the Murray River and the New South Wales border. A former Corryong resident, Jack Riley, is believed by many to be Banjo Paterson's model for "The Man From Snowy River" - hence the title of the festival.



It takes place in two parts - horse events, and poetry events. Maggie and I attended the poetry. I don't believe we saw a horse all weekend, though we did see a few bullocks. Most of the poetry festival is given over to bush poetry competition. This year it hosted the Australian **Bush Poets' Association National** Championships. Not being active competitors, Maggie and I were confined to the role of spectators most of the time. We did, however, perform at the Poets' Breakfast on the Sunday morning.

We camped in a paddock across the road from the hall where all the action took place. The Corryong Lions Club catered magnificently for the event. The facilities were generally excellent, though Maggie would love to have found a toilet at 5 am on the Sunday morning!
