The Penguin Australian Encyclopaedia is an essential contemporary reference book for homes, schools, libraries and offices. Its comprehensive range of topics includes subjects of particular relevance in the late 20th century, such as the arts, business, economics, the environment, industry, politics, society, and science and technology. With over 2000 entries, including some 700 biographies, the encyclopaedia provides accurate and up-to-date information on Australia's natural environment as well as the people, events and institutions that have helped shape Australian life today. It also looks at fundamental issues facing Australian society, both now and in the future.

The text is arranged in simple alphabetical order and careful use of cross-references further ensures that information is easy to find. There are more than 80 extended entries on major topics, such as Aboriginal culture and society, the economy, the environment and conservation, law and the changing legal system, and social welfare – and for convenience these are indexed at the front of the book. Other invaluable features include an appendix listing all colonial, state and federal governments, and a 16-page section of full-colour maps and statistical charts.

The Penguin Australian Encyclopaedia is a compact compendium of useful information. It is distinguished by a highly readable writing style that is sometimes opinionated, but always lively and direct.
